History of Pastor Appreciation Day

Pastor Appreciation Day originated in 1992, initially known as Clergy Appreciation Day. This day was born out of a desire to acknowledge and thank pastors for their extensive work beyond the pulpit.

This includes guiding their congregations spiritually and emotionally without the confines of a typical work schedule. Pastors often work under considerable stress, with little to no downtime, showing appreciation for their tireless efforts.

The concept of setting aside a day specifically for pastor appreciation was driven by the realization that if there could be a day to acknowledge groundhogs, there surely should be one to honor the

Inspired by this thought during a brainstorming session, Jerry Frear, Ir. suggested that pastors deserved their special day, which led to the establishment of Pastor Appreciation Day on the second Sunday of

This initiative encouraged congregations to celebrate and support their pastors and leaders, recognizing their vital role in the church and

Focus on the Family significantly championed the promotion of Clergy Appreciation Month and Pastor Appreciation Day in the early 1990s.

This effort reminded congregations of the importance of acknowledging their clergy staff and families throughout the year, with a special emphasis in October.

The observance has evolved over the years, with congregations finding various meaningful ways to express their gratitude, from notes of encouragement to more substantial gestures like vacations.

The practice of showing appreciation for church leaders is grounded in Biblical principles, as highlighted by Paul in his New Testament letters.

This Biblical basis underscores the importance of honoring those who lead in preaching and teaching. In addition, it recognizes the double honor they are due for their commitment and the stresses associated with their roles.

ORANGEBURG MASSACRE (1968)

The **Orangeburg Massacre** took place in Orangeburg, South Carolina at South Carolina State University on February 8, 1968. This horrific incident ended with three young men killed, Samuel Hammond, Henry Smith, and Delano Middleton, and twenty-seven other students wounded. It was the worst example of violence on a college campus in South Carolina's history.

The incident began when approximately 200 students gathered on February 6 to protest the segregation of black patrons at the nearby All Star Bowling Lanes. The first demonstration proceeded without incident. The following night many of the students returned to resume the protest, but, in this instance, fifteen of them were arrested. The third night, February 8, tensions were already running high on both sides from the previous night's arrests.

The students gathered on the South Carolina State University campus instead of at the bowling alley. They built a bonfire which a law enforcement officer attempted to put out. In the process, he was injured by a piece of a banister thrown from the crowd. A highway patrolman then fired his gun into the air in an attempt to calm the crowd. Upon hearing the shot, other officers, thinking they were being fired upon, opened fire into the crowd of students.

Hammond and Smith, who were South Carolina State University students, and Middleton, a 17-year-old high school student, were killed and 27 other students were wounded. The high death and injury totals came in part because officers used shotguns with buckshot when they fired into the crowd. Many of the victims were shot in their backs or through the soles of their feet as they ran. None of the students were armed.

Nine officers were held responsible for the shootings and were brought to trial on charges of excessive force at a campus protest.

All nine were acquitted of all charges. The only person who was charged and sent to prison as a result of this incident was Cleveland Sellers, the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) representative who was convicted of inciting the riot that had led to the shootings. Sellers was later pardoned for his role in the incident.

The day after the shootings Governor Robert E. McNair spoke of this as "one of the saddest days in the history of South Carolina."

National Bullying Prevention Month

More than a decade together against bullying and united for kindness, acceptance and inclusion.

National Bullying Prevention Month is a campaign in the United States founded in 2006 by PACER's National Bullying Prevention Center. The campaign is held during the month of October and unites communities nationwide to educate and raise awareness of bullying prevention. Initially held the first week in October, the event was expanded in 2010 to the entire month.

PACER developed the initial campaign, National Bullying Prevention and Awareness Week, to raise awareness about bullying. Historically, bullying had been viewed as "a childhood rite of passage" that "made kids tougher," but the reality has always been that bullying can leave devastating and often long-term effects such as a loss of self-esteem, increased anxiety, and depression for those involved. PACER reached out to the community through partnerships with education-based organizations such as the National PTA, the American Federation of Teachers and the National Education Association to provide schools, parents and students with the educational resources and support to better respond to bullying behavior. The National Bullying Prevention Center laid the groundwork so that National Bullying Prevention Month is now a nationwide call to action around educating communities as to their roles in bullying prevention. This initiative has helped shift thinking away from bullying as "rite of passage" and toward the knowledge that bullying can be prevented and stopped through education and awareness.



National Bullying Prevention Month is recognized in communities across the United States, with hundreds of schools and organizations signing on as partners. Facebook, Disney, Instagram, CNN, TLC and Yahoo! Kids and many others have supported the month through media outreach and dissemination.





Celebrating Spiritual Leadership

An effective leader "should be the goal of every person serving in ministry." The Lord called individuals to salvation and into service for the glory of God. The unique thing is none of us who were called are perfect. Human imperfections are not a problem for God, but they can be crippling complications for ministry.

As we move forward, leadership must "...press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:14). Hello from Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia (CSFP)!

<u>CSFP</u> awards partial, need-based K-8th grade scholarships for Philadelphia students to attend more than 150 tuition-based schools in the area. Our scholarships are awarded via a random lottery, for up to three children per family, per year.

As a trusted community organization that serves families in the City, we want to ask for your help to spread the word about our program! Our scholarship lottery application opened on September 16, 2025 and we are currently accepting applications for families interested in receiving funding for the 2026-2027 School Year.

We would be grateful if you could share this information with your constituents. To aid with information sharing, we have created a Partner Toolkit with pre-drafted social media or newsletter content, social media graphics, and printable flyers.

Please encourage families to apply by November 15th to be included in the Priority Lottery in December!

More about CSFP scholarships...

- CSFP scholarships total \$1,250, \$2,500 or \$3,350 per child. Funds are dispersed directly to the schools to help cover tuition-costs.
- CSFP scholarships carry students through 8th grade, as long as families still meet annual income and residency requirements.
- Parents can pick from <u>150+ partner</u> <u>schools</u> in the Greater Philadelphia region.
- CSFP scholarships are awarded via random lottery so all students have a fair and equitable chance of winning the lottery.
- Eligibility is simple: (1) families must live in Philadelphia, (2) meet income guidelines, (3) and have a child entering K-8th in September 2026.
- The application takes less than 5
 minutes and can be completed without
 accessing sensitive documents!

Breast Cancer Facts

What is breast cancer?

Breast cancer is a disease in which malignant (cancer) cells form in the tissues of the breast.



Facts about Breast Cancer in the United States

- •One in eight women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime.
- •Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in women.
- •Breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death among women.
- •Each year, it is estimated that over 246,660 women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer and more than 40,000 will die.
- •Although breast cancer in men is rare, an estimated 2,600 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer and approximately 440 will die each year.
- •On average, every 2 minutes a woman is diagnosed with breast cancer and 1 woman will die of breast cancer every 13 minutes.
- •Over 2.8 million breast cancer survivors are alive in the United States today.



A Global Burden

According to the World Health Organization, breast cancer is the most common cancer among women worldwide, claiming the lives of hundreds of thousands of women each year and affecting countries at all levels of modernization.

Good News About Breast Cancer Trends

In recent years, perhaps coinciding with the decline in prescriptive hormone replacement therapy after menopause, we have seen a gradual reduction in female breast cancer incidence rates among women aged 50 and older. Death rates from breast cancer have been declining since about 1990, in part due to better screening and early detection, increased awareness, and continually improving treatment options.
